 1978
- The concept: a cradle outside the gate of the home
- The cradle: underneath has an electronic alarm system

- Adoption in India is centralized by the government
- Total adoptions in India yearly: 3000
- Every state has registered licensed adoption agencies
- In Delhi: 9 authorized adoption agencies

- Adoption ensures security & continuity
- Earlier adoption was for only Hindu's and not other faiths
- Other faiths only took children as legal guardians
- Thereafter in 2015 the Juvenile Justice Act was formulated and all individuals – single & married can legally adopt
- Religion in adoption no longer matters

Palna.....

- Palna, a haven of peace, security, stability for children who arrive
- DCCW,Palna: since 1978 has placed about 3000 children
- Infants who arrive are: low birth weight; hypothermic; with trauma & congenital defects; precarious & fragile state of health
- Palna's multi speciality team takes over and if required hospitals provide spontaneous support

Palna.....adoption procedure

- Baby is left in the cradle/abandoned at public places, then brought by Police
- Baby is produced before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC)
- Police- First Information Received (FIR)
- CWC clearance 4 months
- Newspaper advertisement
- Track the missing any FIR lodged for kidnapping/lost child
- Thereafter declared legally free for adoption
- Uploaded on the CARA Portal (Central Adoption Resource Authority)
- The child's recent photograph; medical examination report (MER) & child study report (CSR)
- When shown to registered family accepted by family

Palna.....adoption

- Before adoption/placing a child.....
- Home study/complete investigation of the couple- family background – education – income – motivation by a qualified experienced professional Social Worker
- The home study report is then uploaded
- The registered couple waits for a referral from CARA
- Once received they accept or refuse and again wait for their turn at the bottom of the list
- Average waiting time 2 years for a referral
